Target Audience:

The Short Course in Clinical Research is designed for individuals who are or will be conducting research in healthcare settings including social workers, clinical scientists from disciplines such as medicine, pharmacy, nursing, or dentistry; counseling psychologists and other disciplines that work with patient populations; or novice investigators and junior faculty with interests in clinical research.

Objectives:

Upon completion of the conference, participants should be able to:

- Recognize the importance of adequate training in clinical research
- Describe study designs, sampling and biostatistics as they are applied in experimental research, epidemiological studies, clinical trials and outcomes research
- Differentiate and manage ethical issues in the conduct of clinical and translational research (e.g. scientific misconduct, conflicts of interest, authorship and plagiarism, data integrity, humans as subjects)
- Identify available funding sources for research during various stages of career development and follow appropriate institutional procedures when applying for grants

Short Course Format:

The conference is co-hosted by the University of Wisconsin-Madison (UW) and Howard University (HU). Morning sessions will be large group videoconferences between the two sites. Afternoon sessions will consist of small group break-out sessions.

General Topic Areas*:

Video-conference session topics will include an overview of a clinical research career, ethical considerations in clinical research, racial and ethnic diversity in research and an overview of NIH and NSF organizational funding structures. Break-out sessions will cover various topics in the areas of research designs, statistical applications, human subjects, and how to prepare a grant application. Speakers include experts such as Drs. Orlando Taylor, Thomas Mellman, and Charles Mouton from Howard University and Drs. Norman Fost, Robert Radwin, and Marc Drezner from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.
